

#### Year 7-10 Compulsory Course Structure

English, Mathematics, Science, Global Citizenship, History, Health and PE.

Global Citizenship provides the framework and context for social sciences. Individual subjects are taught in line with the International GCSE Lower Secondary Curriculum Framework.

Additional subjects taught are:

Visual Art, Music, Environmental Studies & Conservation, Te Reo Maori & Japanese.

We collaborate with community groups and utilise community facilities wherever possible to offer learning in the Arts and Outdoor Education, and to ensure learning is consistently relevant and meaningful.

#### **Transferable Skills**

Students develop a range of transferable skills (such as problem solving, critical thinking, leadership and collaboration) as part of their International GCSE curriculum. These skills will ensure that students are better equipped to access higher levels of academic study and will be able to demonstrate highly sought after skills to their future employers.

#### Assessment

Assessment takes a range of forms, including:

- teacher feedback to the student
- self-assessment and tracking by the student
- progression tests and checkpoints administered by teachers and reported against international standards worldwide

Reporting to parents is regular and based on progress and value-added from years 7-10.



# **Pastoral Care**

#### Ngā whānau ropū

Ngā whānau rōpū are vertical groups of students designed to support the values of the college, to encourage role modelling, mentoring and to develop leadership. The whānau structure is also the mechanism for the pastoral care of students, looking after their personal and learning wellbeing.

Whānau groups will meet regularly, work together, and participate in sports events and camps together.

# Learning Support

Individual student learning needs will be discussed at the time of application and will be ongoing with family and caregivers. Where agreed, an individual learning or behaviour plan will be developed with the student and their whānau by qualified personnel. These will be monitored and reviewed regularly.

If there is extra support required for individual students this will be at the parents' cost, unless provided through external funding such as ORS. The College will not be in a position to provide specialist support for learners in the first year of operation, but we will be working towards this as we develop.

#### **Extra-Curricular Activities**

The specific activities for 2025 will be selected according to the interests and abilities of our foundation students, but may include the following:

#### Sport

On campus: fitness, basketball, cricket, football, orienteering, cross fit, stretching & flexibility.

Community facilities and spaces access: tennis, golf, surfing and surf lifesaving, skating, swimming, sailing.

Regular whānau competitions (team sports) Year 7&8: AIMS Games Inter-school sports exchanges



# **Outdoor Education**

Two camps per annum

Community based site visits linked to the Global Citizenship learning programme.

#### **School Hours**

School hours are 8.30am – 3.00pm. Students are expected to be at school, ready to start the day's programme promptly at 8.30am. Students will not be permitted to leave the school campus unsupervised or without permission during school hours.

# **Dress Code**

There is not a school uniform for 2025, but students are expected to follow the following dress code:

- Clothing and accessories should be clean and tidy and suitable for a school learning environment.
- Footwear must be worn to school and should be flat and sensible, suitable for walking distances and moving about on rough terrain. Where required for certain activities and EOTC events, students may be required to wear fully enclosed shoes for safety reasons.
- Clothing must uphold a modest standard i.e. cover the body appropriately, no bare midriffs and a modest length for shorts, skirts & dresses.
- Jewellery should be kept to a minimum: modest earrings, simple necklaces and items of cultural significance.

Whilst every care will be taken and a culture of respect developed, Mangawhai Hills College takes no responsibility for the loss or damage to any item of clothing or any personal effect while on school grounds. If personal effects are precious, please leave them at home.



# **Enrolment & Fees**

#### **Enrolment Procedure**

1. Apply by using the digital Application to Enrol form available on the Mangawhai Hills College website. This is non-binding on both parties.

2. Provide further documentation (such as a current school report, birth certificate) and attend a face-to-face interview.

3. An Offer of Place is given by the College, and acceptance is indicated by completing the formal enrolment form provided and payment of a non-refundable, one-off application fee of \$2,250 (incl GST). This fee is deducted from the Term 4 fee in the first year.

#### Enrolment Timeline for 2025 & 2026

Applications for students wishing to start in 2025 will be processed as they are submitted throughout the 2025 year.

**Enrolments for 2026** 

April – June 2025	Application to Enrol Form completed (Step 1 above).
June - July 2025	Interviews and documentation (Step 2 above).
By 31 July 2025	Offer of Place extended (Step 3 above).
By 31 August 2025	Acceptance and payment of application fee made (Step 3 above).
	Completion of the formal enrolment form and Admission Agreement.

19 December 2025 Term 1 2026 tuition fees due.

Further information will be sent to enrolled students and their families in Term 4 2025 outlining the procedures and orientation for the start of school 2026.

# **Tuition Fees**

Annual tuition fees are payable a term in advance and are **non-refundable**. Receipts will be issued.

\$16,000 per annum (\$4,000 per term) incl. GST.

This fee covers:

- Tuition fees, staff salaries & learning resources
- Building maintenance, utilities, consumables
- Building capital grant contributions for future growth
- Student stationery (which is provided)
- Activity fees to contribute to learning experiences in the community

Examination fees (Year 10, 11+) Camp fees Extra-curricular events and competitions such as AIMS games, Tournament of Minds, Mathex.
